FORTHCOMING CONFERENCES

GDR SEMINAR AT SCMLA

"Literature of the GDR" will be the topic of the German section of the forthcoming South Central Modern Language Association conference Dec. 11-13, 1975, in New Orleans. Further information is available from the chairperson Professor Margareta Deschner, Department of Foreign Languages, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas 75222.

A Seminar on the Current Literature of the German Democratic Republic will be held at the World Fellowship Dialogue Center in the White Mountains of New Hampshire (Conway, N.H.), June 20 to June 27, 1975. Sponsored by World Fellowship in cooperation with the GDR Society, the topic will be : "Das Menschenbild in der Modernen Literatur der D.D.R." The Novels of Stefan Heym, Christa Wolf, Herman Kant, and Ulrich Plenzdorf will be discussed. Combining socio-political and theological insights for the understanding of human development in a socialist society, the seminar will be conducted by Rev. W. Christoph Schmauch, President of the GDR Society and Executive Director of World Fellowship. The all-inclusive rate for the week-long seminar is \$85.00 (tuition, room and board). HEINER MÜLLER SEMINAR

The GDR Seminar which had its first meeting at the 1974 MLA convention in New York (and which originated the idea for this newsletter !) will meet again at the 1975 convention in San Francisco. The 1975 topic will be "Drama in the GDR: The Production Plays of Heiner Müller". Again there will be no formal reading of papers but rather guided discussion, for which participants are urged to prepare themselves by reading Müller's plays, readily available in paperback form as Geschichten aus der Produktion 1 und 2 (Berlin West, Rotbuch Verlag, 1974). Zur Heldenwahl und Konfliktgestaltung in Kants Impressum.

She is the Executive Vice President of the GDR Society. Dr. Rubinstein's talk will be followed by discussion with the audience.

TRAVEL AND EXCHANGE

STUDY TOUR FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The Northfield Mount Hermon Summer School sponsors a program for students entering grades 10-13 who want an intense exposure to the language, cul-

ture and history of the German people through living with two German families and travelling in both the Federal Republic and the GDR. The program begins with a five-day orientation at Northfield Mount Hermon School which attempts to help students focus their goals and objectives and prepare them for living with another family. In Europe, the group will travel to Bonn, Mainz, Augsburg, Munich, Garmisch and Nuremberg in the Federal Republic and Erfurt and Dresden in the GDR, including visits to Weimar, Buchenwald, and Eisenach. The program concludes with a visit to West Berlin, a family stay on a farm and a second family stay in Osnabrück, including attending school for two days with German hosts. This years program runs from June 29 - August 14 with an all-inclusive fee of \$ 1450. For further information and application materials contact Harrison F.
