WOMEN MAKING LITERARY HISTORY: THE NEW GENERATION OF WOMEN WRITERS IN THE GERMAN DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC

The theme for the regularly-scheduled sessions to be sponsored by Women in German at the 1983 centennial meeting of the MLA is "Women and Literary History." At this session, we are interested in examining a generatic of writers who are still generally too young to be inclu ded in the retrospective of literary history. What kind of literary history is now being made by the first generation of women who - unlike the more well-known Christa Wolf, Irmcraud Morgner, Sarah Kirsch - have grown up in the socialist GDR? This group would include, but is not limited to, writers such as Daniela Dahn, Helga Königsdorf, Monika Maron, Doris Paschiller, Helga Schubert, Christine Wolter, and Rosemarie Zeplin. How are their experiences and expectations translated into literary expression, both in content and form? To what political and social phenomenon do they respond? Have they succeeded in finding a "female voice"? How do their works fit into the larger context of GDR literary history? What sort of resonance do they have within and beyond their own society? What has been the critical response to their works?

We welcome papers 10-12 pages in length dealing with any aspect of literature by GDR women writers born since about 1940, including theoretical approaches. Please submit one copy of your paper or abstract to each of the following:
