In addition to working in such distinguished offices as Roche Dinkerloo, Paul Rudolph and Johnson and Burgee, Corrigan has served as a visiting professor and lecturer at Yale University, University of Melborne and the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology. A founding partner of Edmond and Corrigan in Melbourne, Corrigan has been published in Architecture in Australia and Architecture and Urbanism.
